



COVID-19 Impact and Recovery Report: Travel-Related Measures

Updated: September 29, 2021

This document provides an evergreen assessment of the situation in Canada. It has the following sections:

1. TRAVEL-RELATED MEASURES

In addition to federal government testing procedures and potential isolation requirements for those who are eligible to enter Canada, individual provinces and territories have implemented measures on travel between provinces and territories. The below table outlines self-isolation requirements for domestic travellers entering into each province or territory, as well as restrictions on travel across provincial and territorial borders. Tracking these measures is challenging given the fluid nature of COVID-19. This information was collected by provincial and territorial tourism marketing authorities and relevant tourism departments and current as of September 29, 2021.

New Brunswick ⁵	As of September 22, no self isolation required for fully vaccinated domestic travellers entering New Brunswick. Unvaccinated or partially vaccinated domestic travellers, including New Brunswick residents, are required to self-isolate for 14 days, or until receiving a negative result from testing on day 10. As of September 7, no self-isolation upon entering New Brunswick for <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals provided that they meet specific <u>entry and testing requirements</u> . Unvaccinated children under 12 years of age of fully vaccinated travellers are not required to quarantine upon entering New Brunswick, but must follow <u>strict public health measures</u> that include avoiding crowded settings.	As of September 22, all Canadian residents entering New Brunswick, including New Brunswick residents re-entering the province, must <u>pre-register</u> , with restrictions for those who are not fully vaccinated or unvaccinated. Prince Edward Island ⁹	As of September 28, fully vaccinated people aged 12 and older entering Prince Edward Island from any province or territory and who have a <u>PEI</u> <u>Pass</u> do not have to self-isolate but are asked to get tested at least once between day 4 and day 8 after arrival. All school-age children under 12 years of age are asked to get tested twice, on day 4 and on day 8. As of September 30, all travellers over the age of 8 entering Prince Edward Island, regardless of vaccination status, will be tested at point of entry. Unvaccinated or partially vaccinated PEI residents and Canadian visitors entering Prince Edward Island from any province or territory are required to complete a <u>declaration form</u> and self-isolate for 8 days, with testing at point of entry and on day 8. As of September 28, no self-isolation upon entering Prince Edward Island for <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals provided that they meet specific <u>entry</u> and testing requirements. All travellers, regadless of vaccine status, are asked to get tested at least once between day 4 and day 8 after arrival. Unvaccinated children under 12 years of age of fully vaccinated travellers are not required to quarantine upon entering Prince Edward Island, but are asked to get tested twice, on day 4 and on day 8, and must follow <u>strict</u> <u>public health measures</u> that include avoiding crowded settings.	As of September 25, residents of Prince Edward Island are advised to avoid non-essential out-of-province travel. All Canadian residents can travel to Prince Edward Island with restrictions for those who do not have a <u>PEI Pass</u> . As of September 28, PEI Passes will only be issued to individuals who have received their second dose of approved vaccine at least 14 days prior. As of September 7, <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals who have a <u>PEI Pass</u> can travel to Prince Edward Island provided that they meet specific <u>entry and testing requirements</u> . Newfoundland and Labrador ^{10,} ¹¹	As of September 30, the Atlantic bubble is suspended: all travellers from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island must declare their vaccination status. In addition, all travellers who are partially vaccinated now have the same requirements as unvaccinated travellers: they must self-isolate for 14 days, but can shorten this period by producing a negative test on day 7 or later after arrival. Fully vaccinated Canadian residents have no testing or self-isolation requirements. Mixed groups of vaccinated and unvaccinated adult travellers must follow the rules for unvaccinated travellers. Unvaccinated children under the age of 12 travelling with fully vaccinated adults are not required to self-isolate. As of September 7, no self-isolation upon entering Newfoundland and Labrador for <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals provided that they meet specific <u>entry and testing requirements</u> . Unvaccinated to quarantine upon entering Newfoundland and Labrador, but must follow <u>strict public health measures</u> that include avoiding crowded settings.	All Canadians are permitted to enter Newfoundland and Labrador. All travellers can complete the <u>Travel Form</u> up to 30 days prior to their travel date. Yukon ¹²	No self-isolation required for domestic travellers entering Yukon. As of September 7, no self-isolation upon entering Yukon for <u>fully</u> <u>vaccinated</u> foreign nationals provided that they meet specific <u>entry and</u> <u>testing requirements</u> . Unvaccinated children under 12 years of age of fully vaccinated travellers are not required to quarantine upon entering Yukon, but must follow <u>strict public health measures</u> that include avoiding crowded settings. The Government of Canada has <u>specific guidelines</u> for driving to or from Alaska through Canada. Read the State of Alaska's <u>health guidance for</u>	No travel restrictions for domestic travellers entering Yukon. Several First Nations governments and communities currently have <u>travel advisories</u> in place. Travellers are asked to travel <u>responsibly</u> and follow the <u>Safe 6</u> . As of September 7, <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals can travel to Yukon provided that they meet specific <u>entry and testing</u> <u>requirements</u> . Entry will continue to be prohibited for foreign nationals who are not fully vaccinated.

Traveller self-isolation required?

No self-isolation required for fully vaccinated travellers admitted into the Northwest Territories (residents, non-resident essential workers or travellers with an exemption). Fully vaccinated travellers going to communities other than Yellowknife, Inuvik, Fort Smith, Hay River, Fort Simpson and Norman Wells require a COVID-19 test on days 1 and 14. Mandatory 8-day self-isolation for partially vaccinated admitted travellers with a COVID-19 test on day 8. Mandatory 10-day self-isolation for unvaccinated admitted travellers, including children under 12 and household members who did not travel, with a COVID-19 test on day 10.

Nunavut 15, 16, 17

As of September 7, no self-isolation upon entering the Northwest Territories for <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals provided that they meet specific <u>entry</u> <u>and testing requirements</u> and who are admitted to enter the Northwest Territories. Unvaccinated children (and those travelling with them) will not be able to forgo the mandatory 10-day isolation requirement. All travellers entering the Northwest Territories must file a self-isolation plan, regardless of vaccination status. To fill out a self-isolation plan and find further information about NWT travel restrictions, visit the Government of the Northwest Territories <u>website</u>.

As of September 17, the Common Travel Area with Churchill, Manitoba is closed. All unvaccinated travellers who arrived in Nunavut on or after September 12 must isolate immediately for 14 days from the day they entered the territory. Vaccinated travellers who returned to Nunavut from Churchill after September 12 must wear a mask and monitor for symptoms for 14 days.

No isolation required for travellers admitted to enter Nunavut who are fully vaccinated and who have received an exemption after completing the <u>Traveller's Declaration Form</u>. Mandatory 14-day isolation for all other admitted travellers prior to boarding a plane to Nunavut except for those travelling directly from Nunavik, Quebec.

Mandatory isolation must occur in government-designated sites in Edmonton, Winnipeg, Ottawa or Yellowknife.

Unvaccinated children travelling with fully vaccinated parents or guardians can self-isolate for 14 days in Nunavut rather than at a governmentdesignated site outside of the territory.

As of September 7, no self-isolation upon entering Nunavut for <u>fully</u> <u>vaccinated</u> foreign nationals provided that they meet specific <u>entry and</u> <u>testing requirements</u> and are admitted to enter Nunavut. Unvaccinated children will not be able to forgo the mandatory 14-day self-isolation requirement. Leisure travel into the Northwest Territories by non-residents is currently not permitted. Exemptions are considered for compassionate reasons, family reunification, exceptional circumstances, travel from Nunavut, and remote tourism with tourism operators with plans approved by the Chief Public Health Officer.

As of September 7, <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals may be authorized to travel to the Northwest Territories only to participate in remote tourism with an approved remote tourism operator provided that they meet specific <u>entry and testing</u> <u>requirements</u>. Fully vaccinated foreign nationals must have an exemption from the Northwest Territories Chief Public Health Officer; exemption requests will be assessed on a case-bycase basis. Entry will continue to be prohibited for foreign nationals who are not fully vaccinated.

As of September 29, travel in and out of Coral Harbour is not recommended.

As of September 20, travel in and out of Kinngait is not recommended.

As of September 17, the Common Travel Area with Churchill, Manitoba is closed. All existing Common Travel Area authorization letters are no longer valid.

Entry into Nunavut requires authorization from the territory's Chief Public Health Officer. Authorization may be granted for: residents, critical workers, those travelling within the Common Travel Area of Nunavik, Quebec, and non-residents entering for family reunification, exercising Aboriginal or treaty rights, or engaging in wilderness tourism with an operator that has an approved Wilderness Tourism Operator COVID-19 Operations Plan.

As of September 7, <u>fully vaccinated</u> foreign nationals may be authorized to travel to Nunavut provided that they meet specific <u>entry and testing requirements</u>. Entry will continue to be prohibited for foreign nationals who are not fully vaccinated. Most Parks Canada places will be open and welcoming visitors with adjustments to access and services. Access to visitor facilities and services may be limited. Most provinces and territories have implemented a framework to guide re-opening strategies catered to their individual circumstances. Since each province and territory is starting from a different baseline to implement the reopening of their local economy, the phases and stages are not congruent across jurisdictions. The table below outlines the current status of restrictions on tourism-related sectors as of September 29, 2021. Unless noted, persons must gather and business must operate with sufficient social distancing measures in place. Many destinations require non-medical masks to be worn and all visitors should plan on having masks ready if needed.
